




The West Lavington Branch of the Mothers' Union met in April when our main topic was Domestic Abuse. The Mothers' Union initiative in helping victims of domestic abuse is called **RISE UP**, which stands for Respond, Inform, Support, Empower, Unite and Pray. Reverend Marion Harrison led us in prayer and was also able to give valuable information regarding safeguarding. There is a freephone helpline called **Fear Free on 01225 775276** for those needing support in Wiltshire.

Domestic abuse was also one of the main topics at The Mothers' Union Spring Gathering, which was held at West Lavington Village Hall on the 24th April. This is an annual meeting for the Salisbury Diocese Mothers' Union. It was a great day, attended by at least 70 members. Also discussed was the Mothers' Union holiday home at Rockley Park in Poole, which provides assisted funding holidays for families on low income or facing hardship. Amongst other topics we heard about the Virtual Baby project, which is a programme that gives Year 10 students skills and experience of becoming a parent. This was successfully carried out last September at Lavington School.





DID YOU KNOW Changes to Local Bus Route numbers

From 15 April the Faresaver bus service **270** to the Lavingtons has been given new route numbers to indicate the direction that the buses run through the villages served. Buses that run via Potterne to the Lavingtons returning via Urchfont will show the number **3A**, whilst the number **3C** will be used for buses running in the opposite direction. The times will also change slightly.

All these services are operated by the Faresaver bus company with funding from Wiltshire Council.

The new Dyson Cancer Centre at the RUH BAth opened for its first patients at the end of April. Thanks in no small part to RUHX and our wonderful supporters, who together raised £10 million towards this cancer services hub for half a million people in the South West.

Commemorating the 80th anniversary of D-Day

The main national events to mark the 80th anniversary of D-Day will take place in Portsmouth and Normandy on 5th and 6th June, and will be televised. A series of beacons will be lit across the country in villages, towns, cities of all sizes at **9.15pm on 6th June, including on Roundway Hill. Devizes.**

A commemorative Torch of Liberation will travel to capital cities and key cemeteries and memorials around the country, including in Edinburgh, Manchester and Portsmouth, before travelling to Normandy across the English Channel with D-Day veterans. The Royal British Legion will be hosting a service of Remembrance at the National Memorial Arboretum on 6th June.



British Normandy Memorial at Ver-sur-Mer, Normandy

In Normandy, there will be a spectacular light show at the Commonwealth War Graves Commission's Bayeux War Cemetery on June 5th, and on June 6th, the MOD and the RBL will Holst the UK's national commemorative event at the British Normandy Memorial in Ver-sur-Mer.

The British Normandy Memorial was inaugurated on 6th June 2019 on the 75th anniversary of D-Day and is the only memorial in Normandy listing the names of the 22,442 people who died under British command on D-Day and during the Battle of Normandy. The UK Government and generous donors collaborated to fund the memorial, which was officially opened on 6th June 2021. The 80th anniversary of the Normandy Landings will be the first time this new Memorial has been at the heart of major anniversary commemorations. It is a stunning place to visit, sitting above Gold Beach. You can find out much more about it, including videos and photographs, at www.britishnormandymemorial.org.uk

Gardening Jobs for June

From Capability Charlotte

- As we approach the longest day, June is the true start of summer. 'Ne'er cast a clout 'til May is out', which means all risk of frost has passed and you can finally put out your tender plants and your hanging baskets.
- I like to give my houseplants a little garden holiday especially on a rainy day. Put them somewhere shady and protected, strong sun can be a bit of shock for them.
- The quote 'June is busting out all over!', always amuses me because June is a difficult month for flowers. The spring flowers are over and the summer flowers are only just getting going. The only things that seem to be 'busting' in June are the weeds. Keep on top of them with hoeing and mulching yes, you can mulch any time of the year.
- Start to pinch out the side shoots of your tomatoes to stop them getting too bushy - these are the little shoots that sprout above each leaf.
- Keep your plants deadheaded to encourage repeat flowering.
- Step up your watering regime, especially with pots and newly-planted plants. Be water-wise and use water harvested from your house and shed roofs, and water in the morning or evening when it is cooler and less likely to evaporate. It is better to give plants a good drench once a week than a little dribble every day. This encourages strong, deep roots.
- Keep a low bowl of water out for birds and hedgehogs, and add marbles to it so bees can also drink from it.
- Shade greenhouses to keep them cool.
- Cut back any leggy looking perennials by about a third (the Chelsea Chop). This will delay flowering and encourage side shoots giving a fuller appearance.
- Stake plants like peonies that are likely to flop.



DID YOU KNOW? National Fare Cap Scheme

All bus passengers are able to make use of the Government's National Fare Cap Scheme, which has now been extended to the end of 2024. All single fares will be capped at £2 single on most services, although home to school services are not included in this scheme. The flat rate cap only applies to single journeys – one trip, on one bus – at any time of day. Return and multi-bus journeys and daily or weekly tickets continue to be charged at their usual price, so it may be cheaper to buy single tickets instead. The cap only applies to bus routes, not to coach fares, and only applies to journeys in England.

DID YOU KNOW?

Wiltshire Bus passes valid from 9.00am

Wiltshire Council has confirmed that holders of Wiltshire concessionary bus passes are now able to use their passes for travel from 9.00am on local bus services on weekdays.

Normally, concessionary bus passes for older and disabled people cannot be used to travel before 9.30am on weekdays, but Wiltshire Council has agreed with bus operators to amend this restriction to 9.00am until further notice, for all journeys that start in the Wiltshire Council local authority area.

Additionally in Wiltshire (but not in Swindon) the bus pass gives free travel on buses after 11pm, where these operate. Concessionary bus passes can be used to travel on any bus service at any time on Saturdays, Sundays and Bank Holidays



Otis Tarda Struggling to survive

Having survived a miserable and inhospitable spring, our garden birds especially are having a hard time. A blackbird built a beautiful nest in early spring only to abandon it due to the unfavourable weather. She has since rebuilt, and managed to get a small brood through to fledgling stage, having survived the increasing number of hazards and predators, such as corvids, grey squirrels, cats and the local marauding sparrow hawk. The only other birds in our garden are a robin or two and a wren, plus the occasional tit. Overwintering blackcaps were few, and other winter migrants were also scarce.

As more land is developed with housing, industry and solar panels, we are losing acres of traditional farmland where birds feed, so the corvids are turning to residential gardens and feeding stations for food, thus depriving the native small birds of their regular sources. Rooks especially are very crafty at getting food from the most sophisticated of feeders with their hammer drill beaks. Some folk have removed their feeding stations due to the incessant filching of food by corvids. Gone are the house sparrows, starlings and the finches. This bodes ill for our already declining garden bird populations. Other residents in our village and further afield are reporting similar declines and intrusions. Some plan to give up feeding completely, especially if they also have the very bold wood pigeons as residents, fouling bird baths and spreading disease.

As for summer visitors, the writer's family has yet to see a single hirondine, though swifts were reported to have arrived early in Yorkshire. Who has seen any locally, or heard a chiff chaff in their usual haunts? Other warbler species are also fewer, and who has heard a cuckoo? Who's seen a bat this year so far? We haven't, and always have in previous years. Anyone who is lucky enough to hear a nightingale, please post the info on your local Facebook page and inform your county website. One piece of good news is the recovery of puffin and kittiwake numbers on the Yorkshire coast due to the banning of sand eel extraction.

Who has seen or heard the large but quite harmless maybug, the noisy cockchafer, barging its way towards lights? However, should you see the far from harmless Asian Hornet, you should report this to DEFRA, or on the Asian Hornet Watch app. It is slightly smaller than the European Hornet at 25 mm long, but has bright yellow lower legs and an orange/yellow stripe on the back of their abdomen.

2023 was the hottest year since modern records began, as hot as the temperature 2,000 years ago. Scientists know this by counting and measuring the growth rings in the trunks of ancient tree species which provide information about the climate at the time. Changing climate patterns are predicted to have ever more negative effects on Planet Earth.

A Message from CIIr Dominic Muns Wiltshire Councillor for The Lavingtons

On my way back from County Hall this evening with the sun shining and the windows down, it felt like Summer! Cutting a path between lush green fields and rolling hills with the music turned up I was struck, as I am each Spring, with the absolute beauty of where we live.

Tomorrow is Full Council where two fellow Cabinet members are tabling a motion seeking acknowledgement of the 'cumulative impact' of solar farms on Wiltshire. As it stands, Lime Down Solar Park threatens more than 2.000 acres of agricultural land in the north of the county. It is so large that it will literally surround some villages on all sides. Obviously, villagers are extremely concerned about the impact to their surroundings over an area equivalent to 1,250 football pitches. Closer to home, Potterne and Easterton also face relatively huge solar applications which will impact the beauty and enjoyment of the area, and the ability for us to grow food on land which has always been farmed.

Considering the huge number of solar applications Wiltshire has been burdened with compared to other counties, I am concerned about how our green landscape might be changed forever. Will there be a time when I drop down the hill from the Bell pub in Seend and no longer see green fields laid out in front of me, but instead just a sea of black reflective panels?

I am equally passionate about doing more to tackle climate change and switching to renewable energy wherever we can. Last week I hosted an event at County Hall which welcomed councillors and campaign groups from Dorset, Somerset, South Gloucestershire, Bristol, and BANES to share ideas on renewable 'community' energy. Standing against huge proposals like Lime Down does not mean I am 'anti-solar' any more than objecting to any particular planning application doesn't make me "anti-house building". In both cases I want to see good proposals in the right places.

Considering the large expanse of industrial buildings around the area with no solar panels on the roof, I have to question why we are covering our quality crop-producing fields with them. If we get to the stage which many diehard environmentalists would like to see, where all our fields are covered with solar panels, we will be able to power the entire country with renewable energy, which would seem great... for a second. However, we will need to import every single piece of food and every naturally grown ingredient we consume because we will have given up the land needed to grow our own. Therefore, the nett gain for the environment will be negative, the planet will be worse off whilst food security for us in this country will be entirely diminished. Furthermore, it is rarely the farmers choosing to swap generations of crop growing for solar on their land. More often it is wealthy landowners evicting tenant farmers, leaving them homeless and without land to farm.

We have to find a balance which protects agricultural land for crop growing and insists on solar panels being placed on industrial buildings and all new houses with some carefully considered solar farms in strategic locations which do not impact crop growing potential.

June 6th 2024 is the 8oth anniversary of D Day. The first troops landed just after midnight and through the course of the day and the days after thousands gave their lives to free the world from tyranny. In remembrance, beacons will be lit across the country.

In Devizes, a beacon will be lit at the **White Horse on Roundway Hill**. The ceremony starts at **20:30** and everyone is invited. If you have served, or are serving now, thank you for what you do.

Our Annual Parish meeting took place in May. This is not a Parish Council meeting, but a meeting where you, our community, can indicate how you want the Parish Council to spend your money. Attendance is never high but it is important. If you couldn't make it you can still have a say at any Parish Council meeting. There is always a public forum at the beginning for questions, statements or requests for grants. Everyone is welcome, come and have your say.

I want to address the emotive issue of dog mess. We do have bins around the recreation ground which we have to pay to be emptied. This is not something Wiltshire Council does. It is a local parish cost, so comes out of all our pockets. One of the questions at the Annual Parish meeting was why can't we have more bins. The answer is simple - we don't have enough money. If we did provide more bins it would impact our ability to support village groups like the Youth Club and the management of the playgrounds.

In a rural community, it is important that dog poop is picked up and disposed of correctly into a bin. You can use any litter bin, the red bins at the rec, or you can take it home and put it in your black bin. Dog mess and farm animals are not compatible. It especially affects cattle and can cause mothers to abort calves. It is essential it is picked up where animals graze or on any field where sileage is cut. Dog mess in sileage, which is a grazing animal feed, is a real and ongoing problem for our farmers. At this time of year, trees and hedges around the village are looking especially beautiful, but this look is not enhanced by the addition of hanging plastic bags with poop inside. Please pick up your dog's poop and dispose of it properly!

Hedges House has been demolished, but as yet we have not received any information from Aster on when construction will start. We will continue our dialogue with them and advise you accordingly.

We are now in the run up to the summer holidays and I want to end by wishing everyone who has taken, or is in the process of taking exams the very best of luck.

Cuddy by Benjamin Myers, Goldsmith's Prize 2023. A novel that combines poetry, prose, play, diary and real historical accounts in retelling the story of the eponymous Anglo-Saxon saint Cuthbert and his connection to Durham Cathedral. Absorbing and magnificent.

Bel Canto by Ann Patchett, Orange Prize for Fiction 2001. A group of terrorists invade a birthday party for an important foreign businessman, taking everyone hostage including a famous opera singer. The relationships between captors and captured become blurred and confinement becomes a way of life.

They don't measure how resilient, kind and compassionate, how inquisitive, brave and thoughtful our pupils are or how well they sing, draw and create, as well as performing and competing in a huge variety of sports.

Fundraising for our pond project: A big thank you to all the family and friends of our DAPS children for supporting them in their Sponsored Run. The children ran an amazing 3,545 laps of our school field and a total of 630 km - a truly staggering amount for such little legs! This year we were raising funds for our pond renovation project, for which our wonderful PTA team have already raised £4,000. So it is with great joy that I can announce that the Sponsored Run raised £5,505, bringing the total to £9,505 so far this year- an amazing amount. This, together with any additional money raised at the quiz night and other summer fun activities planned, will allow us to renovate our pond and to build a dock for the children for use in their outdoor learning lessons.

I am so grateful to everybody who supports our school. The support that we receive really enriches school life for all our children and makes a huge difference to them too.

According to the old cliche, church ministers only work one day a week. That would be nice, but no. In fact, I only tend to take one day off a week, Saturday. Apart from when there's also a Bank Holiday Monday, of course. The wife and I thought it would be fun if we went to Bournemouth either on the first Saturday of May or the Bank Holiday Monday. But as the weekend drew nearer rain was predicted both for both days, and so it turned out. However,

it was glorious sunshine the following Saturday, so to Bournemouth we did go.

On such days you'd think parking anywhere near the beach would be a hassle. But there's a street we know where you can park all day for free, only five minutes' walk from the seafront. We've never failed to find a space and, as it happened, one was available immediately we turned into the road. From there you stroll to the seaside down a street with pay and display parking bays which cost you £13.50 for six hours and that's before you've even bought an ice cream. Extortionate.

Oddly, cars were queuing up to park on the pay and display street. Every bay was taken. Some drivers seemed to grow tired of waiting and left to find a space elsewhere. Others chanced it and parked on double yellows. It was dead quiet where we pulled up. No fiddly parking app. No fumbling for change. Free parking all day long. We didn't feel at all smug, honest. In fact, being a preacher and that, this little episode was suggestive of a modern-day parable.

People were bypassing what was available for free, while falling over themselves to park at great cost. It's a bit like that with the Christian faith. With most other outlooks on life, you 'gets what you pays for'. The religious hope that if they keep the rules demanded by their faith, they will earn an eternal reward. Those with a more secular outlook often believe that given enough hard work, they'll get what they deserve and soon they'll be 'living the dream'.

The Christian message is different. It is based not on merit, but grace. Which means God giving us what we don't deserve, free of charge. Jesus willingly paid the price of sin by dying in our place upon the cross. God offers eternal life to everyone who puts their faith in his Son as their Saviour. What's not to like? Yet many people spurn this gracious offer, preferring to pay their own way. Eternal life, however, is a gift that can't be bought.

Of course, it's my bounden duty as a minister of the gospel to proclaim to anyone who will give me a hearing that salvation full and free is available for all in Jesus. The whereabouts of that road with freebie parking, a short stroll from the golden sand and shimmering sea of Bournemouth? Now, that would be telling.

Black Dog Crossroads road closure trial

Wiltshire Council is trialling an Experimental Traffic Regulation Order (ETRO) at the Black Dog Crossroads with the closure of the spur road to the north of the crossroads, which is often used by motorists at peak time to avoid queuing at the main junction. This trial scheme will look at whether closing the spur road reduces collisions and if there is an impact on the surrounding network. This trial is the first stage of improvements to the crossroads: the Council will also be realigning the junction at the crossroads in 2025.

Cllr Nick Holder, Cabinet Member for Highways said the Council will be listening to feedback from locals and motorists to determine whether this temporary change reduces risk at the junction. If this trial is successful, the road closure could be made permanent.


