The West Lavington Branch of the Mothers' Union met in June when Anne Wilson spoke on the theme 'Being a Christian in Japan'. Anne has family who lived in Tokyo, and she has visited there many times. The main 'religion' in Japan in Shintoism, although they know it as a way of life and not a religion. Until 1858 Christians were unwelcome in Japan but now, out of a population of 132 million, 1% are Christian and are free to worship.

On the 6th July we had a stall at the Village Fete selling fresh produce- cakes, vegetables and fruit. The day was quite challenging weather-wise, as the strong wind had other ideas of a neat and tidy display. However, we sold most of our produce and had an enjoyable day meeting villagers and visitors.



September

by Judith Howard

This evocative piece was written by Judith Howard (mother of our gardening guru Charlotte) in 2000 for a creative writing course. Almost a quarter of a century later, despite climate change affecting our weather and the seasons, Judith's words conjure up what most of us still know as September.

September, the ninth month and the summer is over. September, a time of richness and bounty. The crops are gathered in and the fields lie deserted and coarse-stubbled save for the odd pheasant or wood pigeon searching for discarded grain.

The still verdant hedgerows are swagged with trails of fluffy seeded old man's beard, decked with long necklaces of coral-berried wild bryony and embroidered with the deep red of haws and the sealing wax scarlet of the hips of the dog rose. Arching above all the bramble, its great coils of green barbed wire now bearing summer's promise; heavy clusters of luscious fruit, shading through green and orange to deepest black, that purple smudge the mouths of greedy child gatherers.

The woods, a medley of colours; some trees still green, their leaves coarse and leathery, others glow orange-red or have turned lemon yellow, shining like a shaft of morning sun amidst the dense coppices. The Horse Chestnut, its palmate leaves edge-toasted in cinnamon, drops viridian spiked mines that crack open to reveal French-polished conkers, the mahogany treasures of schoolboy's pockets. All about is the sharp citrus smell of falling leaves that edge the pavements and footpaths like discarded cornflakes, crisp crunching and crackling underfoot. Once swept they are piled into bonfires whose acrid smell and lazy ostrich plumes of lilac smoke permeate the crisp evening air and fill one's hair with the smell of autumn.

The cottage gardens bear the final vestiges of summer. Rose bushes untidily straggle upwards bearing overblown blooms like blousy barmaids; their petals bruised by the attention of wind and rain. The bright mauves and magentas of the Michaelmas daisy glow in the heat of an Indian summer and are a popular meeting place for indolent bees and butterflies gathering the last of the honey and nectar before their winter hibernation. Great candelabras of inky elderberries are food for rapacious starlings who action paint the stone slabs of the terrace with spatterings of purple and mauve.

All around one hears the mournful falling cadences of birds as they depart for sunnier climes and the wind in the trees as it rustles the drying leaves. The nights are drawing in, which bring to mind log fires, hot mugs of cocoa, Christmas and spring and a new beginning.

DID YOU KNOW?

How to avoid a kitchen fire nightmare - COOK WITH CARE

In July, Dorset and Wiltshire Fire and Rescue Service (DWFRS) launched a new safety campaign, Cook with Care, with a focus on preventing cooking-related incidents and reducing kitchen fires. More than half of accidental fires in the home start in the kitchen, most while the victims are in another room. Common causes of these fires were: cooking being left unattended; items being left on hot cooker hobs, such as tea towels and small kitchen appliances; and metal objects placed in microwaves. During 2023, one third of kitchen fires attended by DWFRS were in the homes of people aged over 65 and living alone.

By highlighting some of the potential dangers in the kitchen, DWFRS hope to encourage safer cooking behaviours amongst those most at risk. In particular, if you have an older friend or relative who lives alone, please share this advice with them.

Gardening with Capability Charlotte Gardening Jobs for September

September marks the transition from summer to autumn, making it a busy month for gardeners. As temperatures drop and daylight hours shorten, there are plenty of gardening tasks to keep you occupied.

Lawn Care: revitalise your lawn. Scarify the grass to remove thatch, aerate to improve drainage, and apply autumn feed to prepare it for the colder months.

Planting: plant spring bulbs like daffodils, crocuses, and tulips. It's also ideal for planting perennials and shrubs, giving them time to establish before winter. Consider adding winter pansies and violas for autumn colour.

Harvesting: pick the last of your tomatoes, beans, and courgettes. Early autumn fruits like apples, pears, and plums are also ready to be gathered. Elderberries should be ready to forage and make a great cordial to fend off winter colds, pick sloe berries for sloe gin. Remember to leave plenty for the birds.

Pruning and tidying: prune late-flowering shrubs, deadhead roses, and clear away any faded annuals. This tidying prevents diseases and pests from overwintering in your garden.

Mulch: add the first layer of mulch to feed the soil and help control weeds. Any organic mulch is fine - just make sure manure is well rotted.

Dodgy Lodgers

We had a jackdaw nest in our chimney. It was very entertaining. The jackdaw couple seemed to be having a domestic every night, making a considerable noise. If they'd been people, the police would have been called! Periodically, twigs etc would drop down the chimney. When the eggs were hatched, the noise increased, but eventually they fledged. We got a chimney sweep to clear the chimney and fit a cowl. The twigs started just above the fireplace to nearly the top of the chimney - filled completely two Green Bins. We enjoyed having our lodgers, but decided once was enough.

Jackdaws have increased in numbers since the 1960s, which is rather surprising considering that many of their nesting sites are no longer available - chimney stacks are now either cowled or wired over due in part to domestic heating.

When choosing a chimney for their nest site jackdaws drop twigs and sticks down the flue until a few lodge across it, establishing a firm base for their nest. They continue to drop sticks down until they reach the desired height for their nest. Such nests often caught fire when the kindling and coal in the grate were ignited!

Jackdaws are accomplished thieves - they plunder other birds' nests for the eggs and nestlings, and also raid garden bird feeders, which are frequently damaged by them and other corvids. They are highly social, gathering in noisy flocks and performing aerial acrobatics. They mate for life, choosing their mate in their first year but don't breed until the following year. The pair will perch side by side preening each other. Their name originates from their call ' daw', the' jack' part meaning a rogue, or knave.

Perhaps you have seen the romantic habits of wood pigeons, whose squabs (young) may hatch as late as October. Local pigeons are becoming something of a problem now in gardens due to loss of woodland habitat and arable foraging. Most birds will have finished breeding now and will be skulking away in the undergrowth moulting, losing their tails and shedding feathers ready to meet all comers in the early autumn to claim territories. They will chase away intruders, even those from their own broods, choosing vantage points from which to sing around their territories to announce that 'this garden is mine.'

Consider slowing down your lives for a few days by taking time after work and at weekends to sit in your garden in different places and at different times. As well as lessening stress and forgetting work problems for a while, you will be surprised at what the wildlife is up to. Sitting silently outside in July I caught a movement- something dark, about the size of a bumble bee. As I watched it came again, climbing rapidly up the side of a planter, possibly attracted by the live mealworms we feed our garden birds. It was a pygmy shrew! These smallest of British mammals need to eat three times their weight a day in order to survive, since as a prey species they use up a great deal of energy rushing about at great speed. A fritillary butterfly also landed briefly beside me, a great thrill as reportedly 80% of our butterflies are diminishing in number, although there are encouraging reports about Red Admirals and Holly Blues bucking the trend.

Due to the devastating effects of Dutch Elm Disease in the 1960s, much of our countryside looked as if it had been nuked. In Wiltshire elms were once so plentiful that they were known as Wiltshire weeds. The Government and woodland charities started a project in the 70s 'Plant a Tree in '73'. Let us take up this mantle again in our decade with 'Plant More in '24'.

A Message from Cllr Dominic Muns Wiltshire Councillor for The Lavingtons

I hope you had a lovely summer and saw some sunshine, either at home in The Lavingtons or further afield. There were lots of local events held across the area and thankfully I got to enjoy several in between work and childcare. It was good to catch-up with many of you on my travels.

As I reported at the start of the summer, traffic lights will be installed at Black Dog crossroads in the spring. With that project developing at pace behind the scenes I wanted to discuss the cause of accidents at the junction and why some suggestions won't work or can't be delivered.

Poor judgement is the cause of every accident I have seen in the last ten years. I can't think of a single incident that wasn't caused by someone pulling out from Worton or Broadway in front of a vehicle on the A360. The errors are usually explained by poor visibility and/or excess speed of A360 traffic. However, the fault always rests with the driver pulling out, even in cases when the vehicle on the A360 is speeding. This might not seem fair, but it is a fact of highway code and motoring law.

A roundabout was explored early in the project but given what we now know about the impossibility of acquiring extra land from a neighbouring landowner, that idea is impossible. Furthermore, the DfT says that roundabouts on a 50mph road need to be illuminated and so aside from being impossible from a space point of view, it would also be significantly more expensive. Traffic lights therefore are the best option available given the constraints that exist.

All sorts of temporary mitigation steps have been suggested including lowering the speed limit. This is something I have been pushing for since my election and unfortunately the decision does not solely rest with Wiltshire Council. Wiltshire Police have a veto and they have chosen not to support a reduction. Of course, reducing any limit does not guarantee every driver will comply anyway. This creates a more dangerous situation where the driver sat at the Worton turning might assume all cars are doing 40mph and pulls out accordingly, failing to spot that the other car is travelling much faster than even the previous 50mph limit.

I am exploring what temporary signage might be installed to cover the short gap between now and the traffic light switch-on. I don't believe a sign will make any difference to someone's decision to pull out in front of a moving vehicle, but it might help encourage A360 traffic to stick to the speed limit and have their foot hovering over the brake. I will keep you posted as I find out more.

God considers it a loan to Him every time you give to the poor. It's not a gift, it's a loan.

God promises that he will always pay you back.


