

REFLECTION

During this season in our Benefice without a rector, different church members are delighted to share a monthly reflection with you. This month it is written by Rev'd Caroline Spindlow, who lives in West Lavington, and helps to lead some of the services across the Benefice of the Lavingtons, Cheverells and Easterton.

Now who doesn't like a good wedding?

It's really quite something when your son phones you up and says, 'Mum, will you marry us?'! It's probably every vicar's dream: to

marry their child with a wonderful partner and invite God into their marriage. A marriage that we would be praying would reflect His love, His generosity and His Joy. And, after all, if God is love then who else to ask to be part of their loving relationship!

This wedding was to be slightly different though. My son's fiancee is Greek and the daughter of a Greek Orthodox priest. So not only was I able to marry my son, her father was able to do a blessing of wedding crowns – a Greek orthodox tradition - and say some Greek prayers.

It was also different because the couple wanted the dog they love passionately, Olive, to be part of the ceremony. So she was bought a new attachment to her collar that had a neat little pocket to hold the rings. The plan was that she would run down the nave at the appropriate time and deliver them to the best man who would then take them out and give them to me. High excitement – and it worked!

And then there is the beauty of the service that is highlighted by wonderful organ playing, delightful choir singing and bells joyfully ringing. All enhancing the special day that two people, who love each other, become legally married.



Every service is so unique to each couple. It is such a privilege to help them find material that reflects their own characters, hopes and dreams. And wonderful to hear the different poems, pop songs, love songs, choral music, readings and bible reading that they have chosen. I get to put my own stamp on it too by choosing blessings that I think are especially appropriate. Blessings and messages that tell them to be silly at times, be attentive to each other, and urge them not to work so hard that they forget to play together. Blessings that remind them that God will be with them throughout their married lives being there for them to turn to in the tough times as well as in the most joyful times.

Rageh Omaar

Mercers Lecture, Memorial Hall, Dauntsey's School Wednesday 19th March 7.30pm

Rageh Omaar is the International Affairs Editor of ITV News and presenter of ITV's flagship News at Ten programme and the presenter of ITV's global current affairs programme On Assignment. Previously, Rageh was Senior Foreign Correspondent and Africa Correspondent for the BBC. He reported regularly from Israel and Gaza after the Oslo Accords and covered the second Gulf War from Baghdad. During the war in Afghanistan, he was the only western journalist permitted by the Taliban to report from inside Kabul before their forces fell to the US and their Afghan Northern Alliance allies in 2001. He has also been BBC Africa Correspondent and presenter for Al Jazeera English.

Rageh has won numerous international awards for his reporting, and is a published author of two books - one on the 2003 Iraq Invasion and one on growing up as a British Muslim. He is a Trustee of the British Council and was educated at New College, Oxford University.

Dauntsey's Choral Society Closes

It is with sadness that we report the closing of Dauntsey's Choral Society after so many years performing in wonderful inter-generational concerts with Dauntsey's School pupils, both singers and musicians. Over forty-five years ago, for the sheer pleasure of it, a group of staff, pupils and parents got together one afternoon to sing, and this evolved into the Choral Society. In the intervening years, as well as performing annually with the School, the Society has also collaborated with other choirs celebrating the opening of new buildings, and as fundraisers for local churches and causes. Our last concert was in March last year, performing Bernstein's Chichester Psalms and Mozart's Requiem with Dauntsey pupils and orchestra. However, our numbers have never really recovered from Covid, despite reforming in 2022, and it has been almost impossible to attract members in the numbers we once had. Sadly, our plans for a concert this year have proved unrealistic in the face of the extremely busy timetable of the School Music Department, dwindling parent representation, and the lack of success in recruiting younger blood to keep the Society on its feet.

Those of us who were involved over the years have had the opportunity to sing some wonderful choral music and support and encourage pupils in Dauntsey's own school choirs to discover the joys and challenges of the great choral masterpieces. It has been a marvellous experience, and we can only hope it can be repeated in the future by another such Society.

Gardening Jobs for March

It's good to see and hear on radio and TV more attention being given to nature and the ever increasing problems around the world with declining habitats and declining species, with many birds and animals worldwide on Red Lists. Human activity is resulting in chemical, plastic and oil pollution of the oceans, plus increased carbon dioxide in the atmosphere, creating stronger ocean currents and wind direction changes, which are worse for the planet. More frequent storms and droughts are also creating mass migration of peoples on all the populated continents.

No doubt these events will get worse. Scientific studies worldwide confirm rising temperatures and scientists internationally are warning that global warming will continue. The effects on nature in this country include sycamore trees being hit by a devastating disease called 'Sooty Bark Blight', and storms such as Storm Darragh and others felling hundreds of trees around the British Isles. Devastating fires continue in many countries. Birds and animals worldwide are at great risk and one species in eight is threatened with extinction by 2032.

Still, should you wish to get away from it all here's quite a nice job advert: 'Wanted, Ranger for remote island three miles off the West coast of Scotland. Applicants should have a good sense of humour'. There has been no full time human inhabitant on the island of Handa since 1843. Over the summer it is home to over 100,000 birds, including Fulmars, Guillemots and Kittiwakes, and a smaller number of Puffins and Arctic Skuas. Offshore, whales, seals and dolphins are often seen. There's a caveat to this exciting job advertised by the Scottish Wildlife Trust – the successful applicants must take with them at least enough food for two weeks minimum!

Should you be holidaying in Wales this year and have never seen a red squirrel, go to Plas Newydd on the wooded shores of Anglesey and you could be lucky. I have only ever seen one red squirrel in the British Isles in a wood at Kingsley Green on the Surrey/Sussex border in 1945!

If you have a large nest egg, come into a big inheritance, or win a major lottery prize, consider joining Bird Life International's Rare Bird Club, subscription £5,000 per annum! This moneyed Club does great conservation work around the world, especially for rare and declining species. Or from just £45 a year you could become an ordinary member of Bird Life International. Go to https://www.birdlife.org/world-bird-club/

Lastly, a call to the female of the species, for more women to become ringers (no, not wringing necks – ringing bird legs!) for the British Trust for Ornithology's bird ringing scheme:

On March 11th, the Royal Mail is bringing out a special stamp issue about Garden Wildlife. Apart from the stamps, the information sheet should be of interest. We must keep encouraging our children and future generations to be guardians of our planet.

West Lavington Youth Club

It is some time since we updated everyone on the Youth Club and its activities. When Covid ended, and the Club had been closed for nearly two years, we essentially started from scratch with new staff and certainly new membership. We started with younger members, who have year on year progressed into higher-aged sessions. We then found, with lockdown and closure of schools, many young people found it difficult to re-

integrate back into normal activities with their peers, and comparing pre and post Covid, there is clearly an ongoing problem for some youngsters. We have addressed this issue, not only by training our staff to recognise members who have difficulties, but also to help them deal with it. Amongst grants gratefully received from Parish Councils and the Area Board (i.e. Wiltshire Council) is one which pays for special one-to-one support for those who would otherwise find it impossible to join in with Club activities. All young people can attend the Club with no fear they will be on their own or unsupported.

We have had great support from parents, especially over the last year, some of whom have volunteered to help in Club sessions. The Club does all sorts of things, such as a barbecue and Splashdown in the summer, and ice skating in January. We try and arrange at least two significant trips a year.

Landline telephones are not being withdrawn at the end of the year, despite what you may have heard or read. The only thing that's changing is the technology that connects your home telephone to the local exchange.

Landline phone calls have traditionally been delivered over a network known as the public switched telephone network (PSTN). However, this network is old, and becoming harder and more expensive to maintain, and needs to be replaced. The phone system has used copper wires between your home and the exchange since telephones first arrived in the late 1880s. (Did you know Britain's very first telephones were installed in Devizes?). However, the internet age has changed the way everything connects together, and copper wires are being replaced with fibre optics. Telecom providers are investing in new systems and networks and will need to switch customers away from the old PSTN at the same time as upgrading their technology.

This means that in the future, landline calls will be delivered over digital technology, called Voice Over Internet Protocol (VoIP), also referred to as 'digital phone' or 'digital voice'. These changes have already started, but you don't need to do anything until your provider contacts you to tell you your service is changing. BT has taken the decision to retire its PSTN by January 2027 and this means other providers that use BT's network must follow the same timescale. Other companies with their own networks such as Virgin Media plan to follow a similar timescale.

This change should not cost you anything and you certainly don't have to buy a computer, be forced to use the internet or buy a new broadband service if you don't have one already. If you only have a landline phone at home, you will be able to keep it and to make and receive calls exactly the way you do now (well, almost exactly!).

Your VoIP service will be provided over a broadband connection, so If you already have one, then the VoIP service will use this. If your landline is still plugged into the old BT phone socket, the phone company will probably send you a device to plug your phone into your broadband router instead, or they may send you a new router. If you don't have a broadband connection,

your provider will supply one specifically to support the VoIP service, but you shouldn't pay extra for your VoIP service if you don't take up a broadband service. Either way, your phone line and existing phone number should not disappear.

The bottom line

- The way the telephone system works is changing but you will be able to have a home telephone and use it the same way you do now to make and receive calls.
- If you don't have the internet now, or use broadband, you won't need to after the change.
- Your phone company will make all the technical changes, just wait for them to write to you.
- The change should cost you nothing.
- Beware of scammers!

Questions to ask your provider before you switch to a digital landline (from Ofcom)

- What do I need to do for my new landline to work as soon as possible?
- Will my new landline work in a power cut?
- What can you provide if I only have my landline to call emergency services during a power cut?
- How do I check whether other devices (like care alarms) that use my telephone line will be compatible?
- Will my current handset work on the new system, or do you need to send me a new handset or some other equipment?

Make sure your provider knows about your needs and circumstances

When the time comes for your landline phone to be upgraded, you should talk to your provider about your circumstances and how the service will work for you. You may need extra help to change your service over, if you are dependent on your landline phone to make calls in a power cut, or if you use equipment connected to your phone line such as a telecare or burglar alarm.

Certain devices people use at home, such as care alarms, security alarms and fax machines may also be connected to your landline. If you have a device like this, it might need to be replaced or reconfigured to continue working once you move to a digital service.

Your provider should tell you what you need to do if you have one of these devices. This will include informing your alarm provider so they can make the necessary changes or tell you if your alarm will work with your new VoIP service. If you are buying a new alarm or device, you should ask the manufacturer if it is compatible with VoIP services.

Before you change to a digital landline, let your provider know if:

- you have a care alarm, health pendant or security alarm that uses the telephone line;
- you don't own a mobile phone, or you don't have enough signal at home to call the emergency services in a power cut; or
- you have a disability or any other needs that mean you need extra help with the installation.

Almost the same - except!

Once you have moved to a VoIP or digital service, your landline phone will work in much the same way as it always has, except if you have a power cut, or lose your broadband signal.

A digital phone uses your home electricity and will only work in a power cut if it has a battery back-up. It will also not work if your broadband signal fails. In these instances, phone companies are advising people to use mobile phones as a backup.



If you're dependent on your landline phone — for example, if you don't have a mobile phone or you live somewhere where there's no or poor mobile signal - then your telephone provider must offer you a 'resilience solution' to make sure you can make emergency calls during a power cut. This could be a mobile phone (if you have mobile signal) or a battery-backup unit that connects to your landline phone and provides power in case of a power outage.

According to Age UK, this resilience solution should be provided free of charge to people who are dependent on their landline. If you're not eligible for a free resilience solution, you may be able to purchase one from your provider or another retailer – talk to your provider about the options available to you. NB Back up batteries can cost in the region of £80, according to the BT website.

The decision to close the PSTN has been made by industry, not Ofcom or the UK Government. Ofcom's aim is to make sure customers don't face undue disruption or harm from the changes, and it has rules to protect customers in power cuts, and to require phone companies to provide access to emergency calls at all times.

Beware of Scammers!


As usual, scammers will try and use the changeover to separate you from your cash. They may call and try to frighten you by saying 'You will lose your landline phone unless....' or try to sell you something you don't need, for example 'You must install broadband'. **Don't fall for it. It isn't true.**


Either hang up, or tell them to write to you quoting your phone company's account details. If they insist you do something immediately, ask them to quote the exact amount on your last phone bill and the date it was paid. Scammers will usually hang up at this point. As with all doubtful cold calls, do not give them any personal information.

If you are still unsure, phone the customer service number on your telephone bill and talk to vour phone company - but do it the next day, not immediately after the scammer has called.







It has been almost four years since I was elected to serve as your local Councillor. Now that all the nonsense about mayors and combined authorities has been put to bed (for now at least!), Wiltshire will go to the polls on Thursday 1st May. This will be your chance to have your say as to who you want to represent you for the next four years. I am even more passionate about fighting for The Lavingtons than I was in 2021 and so I have decided that I will stand for election again.

In the next few weeks we will enter the preelection period where everyone, from the Council to news outlets, must ensure that communications are non-political. This then is the last opportunity for me to talk about some of the things we have achieved together as a community of residents with shared experiences, frustrations and objectives.

In my role as Vice-Chairman of the Devizes Area Board, I have awarded grants of more than £50,000 for local community projects across The Lavingtons. This investment has supported West Lavington Youth Club, Worton & Cheverell Football Club, Broadwell Play Area, Market Lavington and West Lavington Halls, and youth outreach work across the area.

You will know from my periodic updates here and on social media that I have delivered on my 2021 election promise to you concerning Black Dog Crossroads. My persistence resulted in the closure of the dangerous spur road and the addition of extra warning signs.

The big win, of course, is the installation of traffic lights, which will begin in the next few months. Next in my sights is a reduction in the speed limit on the A360 to 40mph through the junction; I believe I can deliver this for you in the next two years.

I've worked hard with the parish councils and Community Speed Watch groups to challenge the Chief Constable to increase police presence across The Lavingtons to combat speeding in our villages and we have seen increased patrols as a result. Road safety is incredibly important to me and I continue to champion improvements, including Market Lavington, West Lavington and Great Cheverell High Streets, Kings Road in Easterton and Spin Hill and Parsonage Lane.

I want to keep supporting you for another four years, not only with road safety and community projects, but also in Planning. I have spoken at numerous Planning committees to win refusals for contentious developments that threatened our communities. I remain onhand to assist our parish councils (and you as a resident) with any Planning related issues we face.

I have plans for further improvements, in particular the surface of the B3098 through Market Lavington and Easterton, the crossing on Lavington Lane, HGV traffic through Great Cheverell and the strengthening of our Neighbourhood Plans.

WEST LAVINGTON PARISH COUNCIL

Our village Youth Club successfully applied for additional funding at the Devizes Area Board in February which, together with grants from this and other local Parish Councils, keeps the Club running. The Club is an important part of our community as it provides a safe space for our young people to interact outside of school and, since the pandemic, numbers of attendees have continued to rise. Youth leaders are also able to support those who have additional needs. The Parish Council would like to thank Youth Club leader Joshy and his team and all those who lead and manage this important resource.

The Youth Club was founded by George Baker MBE, a well-known British actor and resident of the village. You can find information on him in some of the books by local historian Lyn Dyson. Lyn wrote many books on the history of the village which she published herself and when she died there was a risk that her books would no longer be available. Thankfully, Lyn's family are starting the process to republish her books, and we look forward to seeing them for sale in the future. If anyone has a wish for a particular title, please let us know via the Contact Us part of our website and we will pass that on to see if popular titles can be prioritised.

We have had a few storms this winter and some very heavy rainfall which, combined with a ground water table that is already saturated, has generated a lot of surface water runoff. The Parish Council thinks that, with climate change, this level of rain and surface water flooding will not improve and our Resilience team views this as the highest ongoing risk to the village. We are lobbying Wiltshire Council continually on gully clearance - not just the visible gully but the pipes that carry the water away. Restrictions in these pipes mean water is not cleared quickly enough to prevent flooding.

You can help! If you know of gullies that are visibly blocked or slow to drain, report it on the **MyWilts phone app** or on line at **https://www.wiltshire.gov.uk/mywilts-online-reporting**

It is only by reporting these issues that we will resolve them. If you have reported drainage issues but feel you have not had a response from Wiltshire Council, tell us at the Parish Council. We cannot directly clear them, but we will follow up with Wiltshire's Drainage Team. Remember to use What-Three-Words to identify the location. https://what3words.com/

The recent storms have also caused a lot of silt to appear along the length of Semington Brook. We have written to all those who own a section of the river to remind them of their riparian responsibilities, which include clearing fallen trees that may affect the flow of the river and reporting other issues to the Environment Agency. It is particularly important to ensure the river flows freely, as this is where our surface water ends up, as both surface water runoff and road drainage go into the river.

Local elections take place on the 1st May for both Wiltshire Council and the Parish Councils. We will provide information on that in News & Views next month and on our social media feeds. The next Parish Council meeting is on **Thursday March 6th at 7pm** in the Giles Room of the Village Hall.

Talking about Generation Z

The Times has published an in-depth survey of the attitudes and opinions of 'Generation Z'. That's people born between 1997 and 2013. From what I can work out, I'm 'Generation X', but unlike the song by The Who, we're not talking about my generation. The survey produced some troubling results. Apparently, 48% of Gen Zers think that Britain is a racist society. Only 11% would fight for King and country. There is a lack of trust in our institutions such as the police and NHS.

The reasons why only 41% of twenty-somethings are proud to be British are discussed in the paper. Kemi Badenoch blames lefty teachers for promoting a negative view of our history and achievements. Columnist Hugo Rifkind identifies difficult economic circumstances as the key problem, 'Give them better lives, today and in the future, and their pride will follow.'

Interestingly, the younger generation seems to be more attuned to the spiritual side of life. According to The Times, '62 percent of 18 to 24-year-olds identified as either 'very' or 'fairly' spiritual.' Only 13% professed to be atheists, opposed to 25% of Gen Xers, who were born between 1965 and 1980. The New Atheist movement associated with Richard Dawkins is evidently petering out. One of their key advocates, Ayaan Hirsi Ali, recently renounced her unbelief and now calls herself a Christian.

It seems that the secular vision of a world in which we can find meaning and satisfaction without God is failing on its own terms. Covid-19 lockdowns stalled economic growth. Rising house prices mean it's hard for young people to get on the property ladder. Social media has messed with their heads, as avid users compare their humdrum lives with the glamorous world of TikTok influencers. As one Gen Zer quoted in The Times reflects, 'I think once they hit that place of, 'I have tried and I am still not good enough,' that's when people are turning to Christianity.'

In his great work, Confessions, Augustine of Hippo (354-430 AD) charts his journey towards God. As a young man he tried all that the world had to offer to satisfy the deepest longings of his soul, but to no avail. He later confessed, 'You have made us for yourself, O Lord, and our heart is restless until it rests in you.' But how may our wayward hearts find rest in God? It's certainly not a matter of being good enough. God deals with us on the basis of grace. He sent his Son, the Lord Jesus to die on the cross so that we may be forgiven by faith in him. Jesus now says to all generations of people, 'Come to me, all who labour and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest.'

"...we who have fled to take hold of the hope set before us may be greatly encouraged.

We have this hope as an anchor for the soul, firm and secure.' Hebrews 6.18-19

Water is an attraction for people. Some enjoy a canal boat for the serenity and security it offers. For the adventurous, the exhilarating experience of white-water rafting has greater appeal.

However, no white-water enthusiast would want their life to resemble rafting, with the constant and desperate struggle to avoid overturning. Yet some people's lives are a bit like that. They are continually battered by the roaring waters of life. They long to be secure in placid waters.

Even in the apparent safety of a harbour, a boat must be anchored, otherwise it will gently drift away with the tide or be swept away in a storm. In these verses, the writer uses the anchor as a symbol of the hope which keeps the Christian fully secure. The Christian's hope is like an anchor firmly embedded in an immovable rock. That rock is Jesus Himself.

Are you are drifting or in fact being battered? Anchoring yourself with Jesus means security forever.

'Whoever brings blessing will be enriched and the one who waters will themselves be watered.' Proverbs 11:25

Our world is filled with people who desperately need encouragement, hope and love. When you feel empty and alone, ask God to bring to mind someone who needs encouragement. You might send a quick message to check on a friend, contact a distant loved one to tell them how you are thinking of them. Perhaps you might call on an elderly relative. You may be encouraged to deliver food to a neighbour or go and check on a friend who is struggling.

Bringing love to those who feel insecure and empty gives them a gift that cannot be valued in monetary terms. Spending time and giving to others ensures that they feel life has meaning. 
