#### **Progress on appointing a new Vicar**

After a Priest leaves a post in the Church of England there is always a gap before a new Priest is appointed, giving churches time to reflect and prepare for their new Priest.

One of the most important tasks at the beginning of the Vacancy is to write a Benefice Profile, which is a description of who and where we are, physically and spiritually, and the kind of Priest we are looking for. The written part of the Profile has been completed and sent to the Bishop for approval. The Bishop will write the final section of the Profile about the Diocese of Salisbury and how our Benefice fits into this. We are extremely grateful to the Assistant Rural Dean, Revd Keith Brindle, for his support in writing the Profile, which he has commended to the Bishop.

The other task is to prepare the accommodation for the new Priest. The Vicarage was vacated last week, and the Property Department will visit shortly to survey the property and prepare a schedule of work required. The timescale for this work to be completed will determine when the post is advertised.

Our Benefice receives patronage (financial support) from Christ Church Oxford. The Parochial Church Councils (PCCs) met the new Patron, Revd Canon Peter Moger, in March and we have been very encouraged by his support for us.

During the Vacancy, all of the PCCs have been working hard to keep the churches running as close to normal as possible. We have been blessed with great support from Revd Caroline Spindlow who is leading two Benefice Holy Communions each month, rotating around the churches. On the other Sundays, each PCC has agreed its individual pattern of services led mostly by Lay Worship Leaders. The feedback from PCCs is that generally things are working well.

#### **Devizes Police Station Changes**

Changes to the Wiltshire police estate in Devizes have been announced by Chief Constable Catherine Roper. These plans are to make essential efficiencies within the estate footprint as part of the required £5.2 million in savings the Force must make in 2025/26. Chief Constable Roper has pledged to improve police visibility in communities and public access to the Force.

By the end of April 2025, the **Devizes Borough Police Station by the Wharf Car Park** will close with the local policing team and detective cohort relocating to **Police Headquarters on London Road**, where a fully functional front desk will be open to the public.

The Neighbourhood Policing Teams will be enhancing their visibility in our communities by increasing the

use of mobile police stations and attending more local events, They will continue to proactively publicise where they will be and how people can engage with them.

Our Neighbourhood Policing Team is Devizes Rural South.

#### Sunday April 13th:

#### Brow Cottage, Seend Hill, Seend, Melksham, SN12 6RU. 1- 5pm Combined admission with Seend House, £8.

A half acre contemporary cottage garden owned by a garden designer and created over the past 25 years. Lawns, well-stocked borders, topiary, potager, sunken pool garden, wildlife pond,

short woodland walk, species bulb and wildflower lawn and canopied dining area. Open with Seend House and connected by a field footpath. Shuttle available. Due to be featured in The English Garden in April 2025. Wheelchair access over gravel driveway rather than steps from pedestrian gate on main road.

Parking on green in village centre. Footpath via fields as marked by yellow signs. Home-made teas. Refreshments in aid of Church of the Holy Cross, Seend.

#### Summer arrives on wings!

Summer visitors cuckoos, house martins, swallows and swifts will all hopefully soon be with us, but sadly all their numbers are in decline

**Cuckoos** arrive in late April, leaving again as early as the first week of June. Their numbers are declining, especially in the southern half of Britain. Since 2011, British Trust for Ornithology researchers have been fitting tracking devices to Cuckoos breeding in Britain and elsewhere as part of the **Cuckoo Tracking Project**. This has revealed that while some birds migrate southeast via Italy, others take a western route. Interestingly, all of the birds winter in the same part of central Africa, and all of them return via the western route in spring.

**House Martins:** migrating to the UK from Africa in early spring, House Martins construct nest cups from mud, and lay two broods on average in a single summer. Declines in House Martin numbers (44% between 1995 and 2022) led to this species being added to the UK Red List in 2020. The reasons for this are not well understood, although birds that build nests on PVC as opposed to brick, concrete or wood have much lower breeding success, with nests more likely to collapse on the PVC substrate. If you are lucky enough to have house martins nesting in your eaves, please be tolerant of their building habits.

**Swallows:** a long-distance migrant, many of our Swallows spend the winter months in South Africa and begin to arrive in the UK during March, staying into October. In recent years a small number of birds have attempted, sometimes successfully, to overwinter in the UK. Swallows can be seen flying at speed just inches above its favoured grassland feeding habitat as it snatches its insect prey. These beautiful birds always return to their old nest sites, so please ensure access to them, as the birds will fly through small openings in order to reach their nesting sites. Numbers have fluctuated sharply in recent decades, with declines seen in England, Wales, Scotland and Northern Ireland since about 2010.

**Swifts** return to Britain in early May. The dark scythe-winged silhouettes of Swifts wheeling about in a blue sky are often accompanied by their screaming calls. Although widespread across much of Britain, they declined by 66% between 1995 and 2022 and are now on the Red List. The reasons for these losses include poor summer weather, a decline in their insect food and continued loss of suitable nesting sites. They require an access tunnel of at least 18" long with a small entrance hole; we can help by installing swift nest boxes, available from the RSPB.

Swifts are believed to spend at much as nine months to a year on the wing, and they are known to nap whilst flying. Swift sightings can be reported to Bradford-on-Avon Swift Group at **climatechampions@gmail.com**, or **www.swift-conservation.org.uk**. There is also now a Swift mapper app which allows members of the public to identify, record and view Swift colony locations and nest sites, sharing their findings with conservationists at the RSPB as well as local Swift action groups. See **swiftmapper.org.uk** 

#### **New Wiltshire RSPB Reserve**

The RSPB is taking over the management of Wiltshire Council's Roundbarrow Farm which will see the transformation of a former intensive dairy farm into a sheep and cattle grazed chalk grassland farm and woodland.

Wiltshire is home to roughly half of the UK's chalk grassland, an internationally important habitat. The UK has lost 80% of these grasslands, and the species they support have faced severe declines. The new RSPB Roundbarrow nature reserve will provide a haven for chalkland species and help a variety of birds, including rare Stone-curlews, Grey Partridges, Skylarks, Corn Buntings, Lapwings and Yellowhammers. Chalk grassland supports a huge array of plant species, which also host many different butterflies, including rare species like Marsh Fritillary, Chalkhill Blue and Silver-spotted Skipper. The move will also help Wiltshire Council to deliver their ambitions for blue and green infrastructure in the area.

RSPB Roundbarrow sits in the internationally protected River Test catchment area. This rare chalk stream is currently at risk from excess pollutant nutrients. Removing intensive dairy farming and shifting to a lower number of sheep and beef cattle will reduce those nutrients and help to protect internationally important chalk streams all the way down to the Solent. The plans will also help to tackle the nature and climate crisis as the natural regeneration and planting of woodland will help to lock in carbon. In addition, a new permissive bridleway will be developed through the reserve, connecting Firsdown and Pitton villages for the first time, and there are plans for a new community orchard.

RSPB Roundbarrow is between Firsdown and Pitton, to the east of Salisbury and roughly seven miles south of the existing RSPB Winterbourne Downs nature reserve.



#### April in the Garden

As Robert Browning said: "Oh, to be in England, Now that April's there"

April is when the garden starts to really come to life. The days are longer, the soil is warming, and everything seems to be growing at once — including the weeds! It's the perfect time to get outside, whether you're planting, pruning, or simply soaking in the spring energy. This is you last chance to split congested perennials.

**Planting for the Season:** April is ideal for sowing hardy annuals like calendula, cornflowers, and nigella directly into the soil. Sweetpeas can be sown at the base of supports. If you're growing vegetables, get carrots, beetroot, and chard in the ground, and if you're lucky enough to have space for potatoes, now's the time to plant them. Tender crops like courgettes and beans can be started under cover, ready for planting out in late May.

**Wildlife Matters:** Your local wildlife is waking up too. Bees are buzzing, birds are nesting, and hedgehogs are emerging from hibernation. Avoid cutting back early spring flowers just yet - primroses and forget-me-nots are vital nectar sources - but do dead head, as letting them go to seed can weaken growth. If you can, leave a few dandelions; they're a lifeline for pollinators. Pond plants can now be added to ponds.

#### Jobs for Now

- Mulch borders to keep moisture in and suppress weeds.
- Weed regularly—they're much easier to deal with while small.
- Prune spring-flowering shrubs like forsythia once they've finished blooming.
- Feed hungry plants like roses and clematis with an organic fertiliser.

April is full of promise, energy, and change. I've always thought it's the best month to be a gardener!

#### DID YOU KNOW

#### Changes to the NHS and your local GP Surgery

It is NHS policy to move many services from hospitals to GP surgeries and from GP Surgeries to Community Pharmacies. As part of this, your GP surgery has been asked to provide new services from April 1st 2025.

Many of these services will involve training staff and purchasing new equipment so will not be immediately available at every surgery. Some may also involve going to a different site within the Primary Care Network rather than your local surgery.

Please be patient with your surgeries as they put these new processes in place. They will reduce the number of journeys you make to hospitals and other providers.



#### **Devizes Flower Club at Salisbury Flower Festival** Liz Cade from Littleton Panell is leading a team of local flower arrangers

As a member of Devizes Flower Club, I will be leading a team of seven arrangers to create a very large floral display for the Festival of Flowers at Salisbury Cathedral this May. The theme this year is **'The Spirit of Water'** and arrangers come from churches within the Diocese, together with Flower Clubs, a number of colleges and individual arrangers.



Our job is to interpret the design title **'Wellspring'** which will be positioned at the spire crossing. It uses a huge tree stump kindly loaned to us by **Henry White of reclaimeddesign.co.uk** Henry has the responsibility of getting the stump from his workshop into the Cathedral for us to work on. Despite the Cathedral being a large space inside, he tells me the access is not easy and I am glad that's not my job!

I don't want to give too much away about our design but it will be tall, very tall, using 2m pieces of willow with large flowers in between and a floral tapestry. I have been sourcing the willow and the Editor kindly gave her tree an early prune, so willow from Littleton Panell will be in the Cathedral.

Devizes Flower Club is part of NAFAS (National Association of Flower Arrangement Societies) and has had representation in previous Cathedral Festivals and the Dahlia Festivals at Stonehenge. The Club meets on







Elections will take place on Thursday 1st May for 98 Unitary Wiltshire Councillors and for the councillors in the Parish and Town Councils in Wiltshire. The key dates for the elections are:

- You have until midnight on Friday 11th April to register to vote, if not already registered.
- You have until 5pm on Monday 14th April to apply for a postal vote, or to change or cancel an existing postal or proxy vote. Apply to vote by post at: www.gov.uk/ apply-postal-vote If you are given a postal vote, you will not be able to vote in person at these elections.
- You have until 5pm on Wednesday 23rd April to apply for a new proxy vote (for someone to vote on your behalf) or to apply for a Voter Authority Certificate if you don't have photo ID. You can apply to vote by proxy at: www.gov.uk/apply-proxyvote If you appoint a proxy, you can vote if you wish, but ONLY if your proxy has not already voted on your behalf and has not got a postal vote for you.

You will only be asked to vote in a Parish Council election if there are more candidates than the number of vacancies. If so, you will be given a ballot at the polling station.

Polls are open on **Thursday 1st May from 7am** - **10pm**. The election results will be confirmed on **Friday 2nd to Saturday 3rd May**.

If you are registered to vote, a poll card should have been sent to you a few weeks ago. This tells you where your polling station will be. You do not need your poll card to vote although it will help the staff at the polling station if you bring it with you. You must bring your photo ID with you to vote at the polling station.

WEST LAVINGTON PARISH COUNCIL



News this month is that our long-awaited Speed Indicator Device poles are being installed. These are the signs that flash your speed and tell you to slow down if you are going too fast. We are receiving two poles, one at the southern end of the village near Rickbarton for northbound traffic and one by the Littleton Panell bus stop for southbound traffic. In addition, our Speed Watch initiative has restarted, and the first one hour session saw 288 cars of which four were over 35mph and three were doing 43 mph. The Parish Council has lobbied the police for enforcement visits which are now taking place. These are three important practical measures that we hope will have an impact on reducing speed within the village.

You will have read that there are a number of road closures around the area for various works. Each time, we receive a number of messages asking for details. The source of knowledge is this website **https://one.network/** This is where all approved road works are posted, now and into the future. We will of course continue to provide details of roadworks on our website and our social media feed.

You may have heard that the Royal Artillery Hunt found its way into our Remembrance Avenue a couple of weeks ago. The reason for this is that the gate at the northwest end of the avenue has been stolen. This is the second time in a year that gates have been stolen from this memorial to the fallen. This will cost us - by that I mean all of us who pay Council Tax - approximately  $\pounds$ 500. If anyone has any information about the theft please do contact us or the police.

We contacted the Hunt about their presence in the Avenue and they told us their incursion was accidental and caused by the missing gate. The Hunt Master wrote *"I would like to apologise unreservedly for our presence there. It was in no way meant to be disrespectful"*. On inspection we found no damage or any mess, so we consider this matter closed.

Local elections take place on **Thursday 1st May** and that will include both Wiltshire Council and Parish Councils. Because of this, there are changes to our dates in May. The Parish Council meeting will now be on **15th May** and the Parish Annual Meeting, which is where the Parish Council reports activities to residents, is on **28th May**. You can find more details and key dates about the local elections elsewhere in this News and Views. Please vote, it is important for everyone to have their voice heard.

I realised I had turned into my mother as I emptied my purse and counted out the exact money for a small purchase at Tesco. The assistant sighed, rolled her eyes and the queue shuffled restlessly as I gathered up my item and the loose change. I remember so well my exasperation as my mother did exactly this.

When we are young, our parents are everything. They're our heroes, our founts of knowledge and our protectors. When we become teenagers they're just embarrassing; we don't want to be seen out with them. Their calls of 'turn that music down', 'We're not Blackpool illuminations', and the guarding of the heating controls, lest we turn it up a degree or two, just seemed irritating.

My parents fought in WW2 and were brought up with rationing and shortages, so they didn't waste anything. One Christmas at my brother's, Mum had helped clear up after dinner and my sister-in-law Annie opened her fridge to find numerous Tupperware dishes, containing two Brussels sprouts, one roast potato, a bit of stuffing etc. She said 'Jean, the war's over' and threw it all away, whilst my mother tut-tutted.

When my parents moved to more manageable accommodation in their 70s, my brother and I spent all day going backwards and forwards to the tip. There were probably about 40 glass jars for jam-making, except my mother never made jam. There were numerous plastic kitchen items, all with a hole burnt in them - she'd place them on the stove forgetting the pilot light. Dad had tools he'd never used and bits and bobs of wood, chicken wire and rusty bolts. His mantra was 'they'll come in useful one day'.

I now find myself turning the heating down and putting on a jumper, turning off lights and not wasting food. Batch-making soup is a wonderful way to use up left overs. Bread pudding and bread and butter pudding are excellent ways of using up stale bread and that Lockdown staple, banana bread, is ideal for bananas on the turn. I made so much banana bread during Lockdown, I'm sure Wiltshire Council could have used it to fill their potholes.

My parents would be proud of me.

#### EBENEZER BAPTIST CHURCH

The crucifixion of Jesus was the supreme manifestation of human malice and hatred. Those who plotted his demise knew he hadn't done anything to deserve being executed upon a cross. Jesus proclaimed a message of love and showed that love in action by healing the sick and feeding the hungry. The ordinary people flocked to hear Jesus' preaching. That was the problem. The Jewish religious establishment was afraid that if

this Jesus movement took off, they would lose their position in society. Innocent though he was, Jesus had to go.

Love so amazing

There was only room for one king in the Roman Empire. It was on that basis the religious leaders manipulated the governor of Judea, Pontus Pilate, into having Jesus put to death. *"If you release this man, you are not Caesar's friend"* they cried. *"Everyone who makes himself a king opposes Caesar."* Sure enough, Pilate handed over Jesus to be crucified. It was customary to attach a charge sheet to the cross of a crucified man. Jesus' read 'The King of the Jews'.

We could see this as one of countless miscarriages of justice that have happened over the course of history to this day. What makes the crucifixion of Jesus unique is that this condemned man was the Son of God. The miracles he performed were signposts to his divine power. Why did Christ not use the power by which he healed the sick and raised the dead to extricate himself from being crucified? Jesus described his God-given mission to his followers in these words: *"Son of Man came not to be served but to serve, and to give his life as a ransom for many."* 

Jesus died for our sins that we may be forgiven and be put right with God. Yes, the cross of Jesus was an act of vile hatred on the part of his enemies. But more profoundly, it was a stunning revelation of the love of God. Paul could reflect *"I live by faith in the Son of God, who loved me and gave himself for me."* 

Isaac Watts's hymn 'When I Survey the Wondrous Cross' is often sung in church services at Eastertime. The hymn concludes on a note of wonder at the love of Jesus for his people:

*'Love so amazing, so divine, demands my soul, my life, my all.'*

That we too will be resurrected: Paul describes the death of the believer as being *"absent from the body ... home with the Lord"* (2 Corinthians 5:8). And when Christ returns, our bodies, and the bodies of all who died in Christ, will receive resurrection life, as body and soul are reunited in a glorified body.

That we can face all our tomorrows triumphantly: Jesus said to Mary and Martha, *"The one who believes in Me will live, even if he dies"* (John 11:25). We have the blessed promise of His comfort and strength as we face the future. Because Jesus rose from the dead and the Holy Spirit is living on the inside of us.
